This definitive record sets out the essential features and characteristics of the BA (Hons) English course. The information provided is accurate for students entering level 4 in the 2025-26 academic year⁵.

Course Summary

The BA (Hons) English course offers an interdisciplinary approach to the study of literature, linguistics, and creative writing. Students engage with contemporary subjects in literary studies, such as young adult fiction, literature and climate change, and adaptation. The course provides students with foundational knowledge and skills in three main areas: literary studies, creative writing, and linguistics. After their first year, students may develop their own interests in these areas through flexible assessments that allow them to examine the module's content through a number of ways, from a linguistic project to an original piece of creative writing. The course is delivered by highly qualified lecturers and practitioners. As

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well as academic and creative skills, students gain valuable work experience and professional recognition through established course partnerships with local schools, arts organisations, publishers, and regional theatres, and have the opportunity to enter exclusive writing competitions. Students develop core critical and creative capacities that are essential to succeed in a diverse and rapidly changing global environment.

Course Aims

- Inspire enthusiasm for English and an appreciation of its past and continuing social, cultural, political and economic importance
- Provide an intellectually stimulating experience of learning and studying, and opportunities for interdisciplinary and contextual approaches
- Encourage students to reflect critically upon the acts of reading and writing and on the history of textual production and reception
- Enable students to adopt a wide range of reading strategies, applied to their own work and the work of others
- Support students in the development of their own writing, and develop their confidence through a critical, technical and creative understanding of the subject/craft/art and of their own creative process
- Foster openness of mind, conceptual sophistication in argument and the ability to engage critically with a range of cultural forms and values
- Provide a basis for further study in English or related subjects and for the teaching of English at all levels
- Develop a range of subject-specific and generic skills of value in graduate employment, including high-order critical, analytic and research skills, and advanced competence in oral and written communication.

As a result, the modules we offer may change over the course of your degree.

Please note that the Professional Practice module may require a DBS check depending on the setting.

Awards

On successful completion of the course, students will be awarded:

- BA (Hons) English with 360 credits, including all mandatory modules from that pathway

Students who leave the course early may be eligible for:

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- DipHE English on successful completion of 240 credits including all mandatory modules at levels 4 and 5.
- CertHE English on successful completion of 120 credits. Including all mandatory modules at level 4

Course Delivery

The course is delivered at Ipswich. Students studying full-time on BA (Hons) English are likely to have between 6 and 9 hours of tutor structured learning per week (plus tutorial appointments). Tutor structured learning will be a mix of seminar, workshop, group work, practical activity, online tasks and guided learning activities through our online learning environment. Students will be expected to undertake more independent study as they progress through their degree.

Course Assessment

A variety of assessments will be used on the course to enable students to experience and adapt to different assessment styles. The assessment methods used will be appropriate to assess each module's intended learning outcomes. Assessment on the course overall will be coursework including critical essays, presentations, annotated bibliographies, creative writing tasks, reflective journals, research papers and independent projects.

Course Team

The academic staff delivering this course are drawn from a team that includes teaching specialists and current practitioners. All staff are qualified in their subjects with their own specialist knowledge to contribute.

Students undertaking BA (Hons) English will be charged tuition fees as detailed below.
